

Program Goals

The Mount Sinai Inflammatory Bowel Diseases Consultant's Course will provide an in-depth review of strategies for participants to better diagnosis, classify and achieve remission in patients with Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. State-of-the-art lectures will be given by expert faculty on optimizing therapies, innovative treatment of fistula, epidemiology of IBD and challenging clinical scenarios such as cancer prevention in colitis, IBD in pregnant and nursing mothers and the elderly.

Case-based discussions and debates will be held. The goal is to help IBD caregivers and physicians meet the needs of our IBD patients by addressing sub-optimal disease control, preventable disease complications, and potential negative consequences of therapy such as serious infections and cancer.

The Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai course directors have selected experts in this field to lend their expertise to highlight the latest advances in the treatment to a disease that affects about 1.6 million people in the US. There will be many opportunities for audience interaction and participation at this year's course.

- Describe treatment options for special populations including pregnant patients and patients with inflammatory spondyloarthropathy.

- ☐ Identify the rationale for positioning of biologic therapies for Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis.
